Programme Goals:

▲ Internship experience:

What does it take to work as a Human Rights activist, social worker or lawyer? Explore this question as you act as an intern for Amnesty International and interact with professionals from Legal Aid. Attend court proceedings, visit the Social Welfare office to learn about settling family issues. Observe traditional methods of conflict resolution in Accra's Muslim community and discover challenges facing the LGBT community..

Cultural Immersion:

Immerse yourself in the rich culture of the country. After your volunteer work, delve into the vibrant Ghanaian culture by witnessing traditional dances, engaging in conversations with locals, and indulging in the diverse flavors of traditional cuisine. Explore the country's history and heritage with fellow volunteers, visiting historical landmarks, experiencing the warmth and hospitality of the local communities, and creating unforgettable memories along the way.

Awareness outreach

Time to put to practice all that you have learnt. Prepare, and lead presentations and discussions on Human Rights issues in schools and communities.

Day 1

Sunday Arrival in Ghana

You will arrive in the Kotoka International Airport in Accra. One of our friendly coordinators will be waiting for you right outside the airport, ready to guide you on an amazing Ghanaian experience.

Our coordinator will then transfer you right away to your new home in Accra. You will meet your host family, learn the rules of the house, and meet your fellow Human Rights volunteers.



Day 2

Monday

Morning:

Embark on a town tour, exploring the local community and immersing yourself in the Ghanaian culture. Register for a local SIM card and you will also be able to exchange currency. Get to know our staff better over a bite to eat at a local restaurant.

Afternoon:

Time to visit your main placements while in Ghana: First Aid Commission and Legal Aid. Become familiar with the schedule and the experiences awaiting you on the program.

Evening:

Enjoy a welcome dinner with the host family and the rest of your group.

Day 3

Tuesday

Morning:

Visit the Accra Mediation Centre, where you will learn about conflict resolution within the local Islamic setting. You will meet the local Imam and observe how cases of domestic abuse are resolved according to Sharia law.

Visit an art centre in Accra, where you will learn about the commercial aspect of art. Understand manufacture, supply chain and trade in Ghana.

Evening:

Afternoon:

Time for a Twi language lesson, where you'll gain the basic vocabulary to better engage in conversation locally.

Day 4

Morning:

Wednesday

One of the lawyers at Legal Aid will explain the role of the commission in ensuring human rights in Ghana. You will learn about specific challenges they face in Ghana and the approaches they have developed to deal with them.

Afternoon:

Continue learning from the Legal Aid Commission by going through paperwork of past cases. Create your work plan for the rest of the week with staff so work will focus on areas of interest to you..

Evening:

Talk with the rest of the group to reflect on your first impressions and experiences so far.

Day 5

Morning:

Observe and support staff as they mediate cases of domestic abuse and other human rights violations.

Thursday

Afternoon:

Take a trip to visit Jamestown Gbekebii, a human rights hotspot in Ghana. This area is home to the LGBTQ movement in Ghana. Over the years it has attracted lots of attention and interventions, especially as the government remains hostile towards the community. You'll learn about issues facing LGBT people and different actions being taken.

Evening:

Get musical! Join traditional dance and drumming lessons. You'll practice drumming with Kpanlogo drums and learn the rhythms that enchant the people of Ghana.

Day 6

Morning:

Friday

Start your day by visiting a court to observe the proceedings in cases taken up by the Legal Aid Commission. Discuss the cases and the next plan of action with the lawyer.

Afternoon:

Review criminal cases with one of the lawyers at the commission. The group can use what they have learnt in a mock court.

Evening:

Have fun playing traditional Ghanaian board games and enjoy dinner at your host family.

Day 7

Day:

Full

Saturday

Wake up early in the morning for a journey to visit Cape Coast Castle. You'll learn about Portuguese colonists and the history of the slave trade in the region.

Afterwards, enjoy a picnic on the beach. There will be a cultural shows with traditional dance and music at your hotel. You'll stay overnight so you can continue exploring the coast tomorrow.

Day 8

Full Day:

Sunday

After breakfast you will visit Kakum National Park and explore a large tropical forest. Your group will cross a high canopy walkway up in the trees - a great vantage point for spotting monkeys, antelope and the occasional elephant. You'll then follow guides to spot alligators in their natural habitat.

Enjoy another picnic on the beach in the afternoon before your return journey to the Akuapem Hills. On the way, you will stop at West Hills Mall to buy snacks.

Day 9

Monday

Morning:

Start your second week with a visit to the Social Welfare Office, where family issues are settled. Meet all parties involved and the social workers who work with them. You may also be able to visit the local prison to explore human rights violations in this setting.

Afternoon:

After lunch, it is time to begin your work with Amnesty International. Learn about their advocacy work in Ghana, their goals and successes so far.

Evening:

Morning:

After a full day of work experience, return to your host family for a relaxing dinner and some traditional board games.

Day 10

Tuesday

Working alongside the local staff at Amnesty International, you will review and become familiar with the various local campaigns and rallies initiated by the organization. In Ghana, a lot of their work is centered around female genital mutilation, reproductive health, as well as advocacy initiatives.

Afternoon:

Continue familiarizing yourself with Amnesty's advocacy work and start preparations for the next day's intervention.

Evening:

Are you in love with the local cuisine yet? Time for a cooking lesson so you cook share this food when you return home.

Day 11

Wednesday

Morning:

Continue your work experience with Amnesty International and further explore the role of a Human Rights activist, online and offline.

Afternoon:

Time to engage in some hands-on activism work through peer engagement. You will travel to a local junior high school to engage in discussions with the students on gender equality, children's rights, reproductive health (such as menstrual hygiene which carries such stigma in Ghana that girls sometimes don't attend school during that time of the month).

Evening:

Put your knowledge of all things Ghana to the test during a quiz night and dinner at the host family accommodation.

Day 12

Thursday

Morning:

Today you will participate in a final workshop with Amnesty International about their experiences of Human Rights in Ghana, as well as on your experience collaborating with them in Accra.

Afternoon:

The group will go sightseeing in Jamestown to learn about slavery in Ghana and its impact on the present human rights issues in the country.

Evening:

Bring out the popcorn because it is time for a movie night at the host family. You're about to discover what African dramas are like.



Day 13

Friday

Morning:

Today you will visit Parliament House. You'll have the chance to engage with the Caucus of Human Rights, and learn what the Ghanaian parliamentarians and legislators do. Don't be afraid to ask them questions!

Afternoon:

After lunch, you'll visit the Dubois Centre, a pan-African organization that promotes Human Rights in Africa. Here you will learn about important individuals in the history of the fight for Human Rights in Africa.

Evening:

End the day, and your 2-week experience, with a fabulous farewell dinner at a traditional local restaurant. Enjoy authentic Ghanaian cuisine one last time.

Day 14

Group members will likely be departing at different times, therefore the last two days may not be the same for everyone.

Saturday


Your exact departure plan will be communicated with you directly by our local team. If you have longer to wait around, we will ensure you are comfortable and well looked-after before being taken to the airport.
